Save water - use less at home, only boil what you need, avoid using a sprinkler in the garden, use water butts


Avoid causing countryside fires especially in long dry periods

Watchet Task Force

We have been supporting the town since the 2023 road closure, with grant funding received from Somerset Council, Watchet Town Council and WACET.

Progress so far:

- New floral displays in Watchet 2 new planters, 5 flower poles, I stone planter, 1 boat
- New signage in Watchet blue signs for pedestrians directing to shops
- Working with Somerset Council to improve signage to Watchet and Blue Anchor
- Social media advertising of Watchet successful campaign under the Love Watchet brand
- Urban Design work for Watchet Feria Urbanism commissioned to hold public consultations resulting in a report launched October 2024 with six recommendations with funding to take two sites forward recently secured
- New Events for Watchet to bring people into the town, these include:
 Words in Watchet literary festival started in February 2024 and held again in 2025 and 2026

Somerset Day - festival on 11th May 2024 and again in 2025

Dragon Hunt – from the railway station

Gardening Show - Sunday 21st July 2024, to be held again in 2025

Backyard Theatre – opened October 2024 in the old Anchor skittle alley and now with a rolling programme of shows - see page 12

Eats Festival - on the Esplanade this June 2025

The Feria report identified six projects to study further:

- A Town entrance at Swain Street / Harbour Road junction
- B Harbour Road and car park
- C Swain Street car park
- D Swain Street / Market Street
- E Market Street car park and old toilet block
- F Watchet Waterside Walk from Splash Point to the West Street Closure

Of the list above, funding has now been secured to take two projects forward: Harbour Road and Swain Street car park. Survey work is being commissioned to understand what lies under the ground which will determine, for instance, if trees can be planted.

Richard Eastham of Feria will be in town again later this year to hold sessions asking people what they would like to see in these two areas which will make them look more attractive spaces to be in. Watch out for notices around town and on social media, and come and take part.

Knight's Tales

Rachel (*Connects*' Editor) messaged me when the monthly St. Decuman's Church Magazine decided to stop printing after the sudden, very sad, death of our recent Editor John Welhams. In that magazine, I have been writing about past and present Watchet happenings for some time, and she wondered if I would consider continuing a contribution in a similar vein in *Connects*.

Our Church readership all know me, but I thought I would introduce myself to the wider Watchet Connects readership. My grandparents lived in Jubilee Terrace, West Street and my father, his two brothers and seven sisters together with an Uncle and Aunt did mean that there were fourteen living in the house. The property remains within the family today with just one resident, my cousin. So, the Knights are a well established Watchet family and respected and active within the community.

At twenty five, way back in 1973, I became the youngest councillor and last person elected to the Watchet Urban District Council and remained on the Watchet Town Council until 1999 (for 6 years as Chair). I was later elected to the West Somerset District Council in 2003 and was Chair, Vice-Chair and Chair of the Planning Committee before standing down 12 years later. Later, District Councillors voted for me to become an Hon. Alderman and this has been extended by the Somerset Councillors. Hon. Alderman is a Courtesy Title, I have a badge to wear at any Civic Event, and am invited to Council Meetings, though I cannot participate. When I pass away, the flags on all Somerset Council buildings will be flown at half mast!! I am still heavily involved with St Decuman's Church, the Christmas Tree Festival (brain child of Sheila Clavey, which goes from strength to strength), Church Tower lighting, and am a long term member of The Watchet Court Leet as well as other organisations supported or run by my direct family.

In my days on Town and District Councils the local County Gazette and Free Press reporters would attend full council meetings and the local community would be fully aware of what was happening. Today much of this has been lost and instead there is much speculation and incorrect information finding its way onto such as Facebook. Some years ago, the late Jenny Hill rang me to suggest I join Facebook to correct so many comments, that still circulate today, regarding for example the Marina project. Maybe in the future I might revisit that topic and other projects I have been involved with such as Knights Templar School, the replacement Railway Bridge, and the Town Cemetery (that took 11 long years of 'struggle').



At this time of the year, I think a lot about one of the highlights of the Watchet Calendar, which from 1977 until the mid 2000's was the Watchet Carnival Parade. This attracted floats from Nether Stowey and surrounds, Porlock, Carhampton, Williton and, at its height, well over a dozen from Watchet itself as well as walking groups. Things have changed, and the emergence of tighter Health & Safety rules plus the loss of the forty-foot trailers from Street Transport and the Wansbrough Mill have seen numbers decline, and recent entries are now mainly walkers. Back in the past, my group (The Blues Carnival Club) first won the carnival with *Christmas Greetings*. This depicted a Stage Coach with four horses. For many years the large Tableau Section prize was keenly contested between ourselves. The Red Cross and The Mothers Club led by Stella Alexander, though despite our competition Stella and I often worked closely together. On one occasion our Bridge that had been part of The Yellow Rose of Texas was recycled to become a part of the Mothers Club's 'Pierrots' float. 'The Blues' were based at Parsonage Farm. which was then a pig farm, and one Sunday when we were working on The Mayflower as part of the 'New World Pioneers' we had to seek refuge on our float as a large boar was on the loose. On another occasion my father alighted from the cab of our lorry straight into a slurry pit!! Lots of memories of fun times; daughter Kirsty being squirted by water pistols from the top of the West Somerset; us getting caught in flags in Liddymore Road and having to be cut out by the police; someone attempting to set fire to the hairs on my legs when I was Little Boy Blue (on the 'Nursery Rhymes' float) and us all travelling to Minehead on the back of the lorries for their carnival. 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In Your Garden with Alan Jones

Some of you will be familiar with my articles which have appeared in St Dec's parish magazine for the last 10 years, but following the sad and sudden death of our editor John Wellhams, it has ceased publication.

My background is simple, I have no professional qualification, but I have loved plants since I was given a cactus when I was 10 years old. During national service in the RAF, I discovered you could propagate geraniums guite easily and so began a lifelong love of growing and

propagating plants and flowers in gardens from Kent, Surrey and now Somerset. And yes I still have some cacti but not the original one. I have learnt a lot in the last 75 years and forgotten half of it. Throughout these years fashions have changed, but one thing always remains the same, the love of plants and flowers and the wildlife we share our garden with.

Changes in farming practice have devastated the life cycles of many birds and insects. Some of these outcomes could and even should have been foreseen, others have come as a nasty surprise, either way residential gardens now have to play an even greater role in helping many species to survive. Thirty years ago we had 16 species of bumble bee widespread throughout Britain, now all but five face extinction, why? Because each year bumble bee colonies start afresh with a single queen who after hibernating through the winter emerges to form a new colony. The colony relies on nectar to feed the gueen and larvae, if nectar is short no new gueen is produced, no new gueen means no new colony. For hundreds of years fields of wild flowers, particularly red clover, have provided the bumble bees with all the nectar they needed and in return the bees pollinated the farmers' crops. This is why gardens have become so important, it is equally important to grow a wide variety of 'old fashioned' plants, because many of the newer varieties have sacrificed nectar for appearance. Look around your garden, and see what the bumble bees are feeding on and plant some more. In our garden early spring bulbs, primulas, hellebores, pansies, violas and even dandelions get you through March to April, next come late daffs and tulips and fruit blossom along with early clematis, then as spring turns to summer buddleia, lavender, foxgloves, marigolds, fuchsias, daisies, rudbeckia and honeysuckle are all popular, and not just with the bees.

Never have gardens been more important to nature. Lots of readers are helping hedgehogs, let's help the humble bumble bee. You don't have to 'rewild'!

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Professor Eric Robinson Geologist 30/10/1929 - 3/5/2025


Recent visitors to Watchet had no idea that the elderly man on the mobility scooter, often surrounded by enthusiastic dogs, was famous geologist Professor Eric Robinson, for whom a Service of Thanksgiving was held at Watchet Methodist Church on May 29th.

Eric was an eminent scientist and a revered figure in British Geology, with an illustrious career spanning more than 70 years. He went out of his way to be anything but an orthodox academic in his passion to make geology useful, relevant and accessible.

Eric always believed that 'geology is an observation science'. During a lifetime's dedication he wrote many books and

guides, advised and appeared on numerous TV programmes and pioneered geological walks as a new way of bringing stones to life. With as many as 250 people joining him sometimes, he would walk the streets to open their eyes to the stones and fossils to be found in buildings and pavements all around. As an expert on gravestones, he took groups to cemeteries such as Highgate and Kensal Rise to celebrate the history and architectural value of the overgrown tombs and memorial stones. He was invited to travel the

world on field trips and expeditions, including to Africa and Russia, and spent time at sea - even going below the waves in a submersible diving bell. He gave courses on conservation at the Architectural Association, was appointed president or chairman of prestigious organisations such as the Geologists' Association and Royal Architectural Society, and worked closely with English Heritage and other historical, conservation and environmental bodies. He mixed with both royalty and the famous - invited to Buckingham Palace and acting as a consultant to Westminster Abbey to uncover a thirteenth century mosaic pavement - but was equally at home teaching his students and working with schoolchildren from the East End of London. Many of his students have gone



on to have impressive careers around the world and kept in touch with the man who inspired them.

Eric was born and grew up in Newcastle - living with his father, a Railway Booking Clerk, and mother in Scotswood. His elder sister, Joyce, died of a ruptured appendix when just a child, and visiting her grave regularly and looking at surrounding gravestones, Eric developed his interest in geology. He won a scholarship to the local grammar school, studying History and English and also teaching himself Latin, though his true love was geology. At the age of 16, Eric was offered places at both Oxford and Cambridge. However, as his father had died when he was 14, never recovering from being gassed in the 1914-18 War, and as University grants at that time were only about £40 a year, this was not manageable for the family. Newcastle University offered £100 a year to undertake a science scholarship, and although he did not have a science background Eric accepted this. His headmaster was furious that he didn't go to Oxford or Cambridge.

While Eric was at university he met his wife Isobel, a teacher and accomplished artist, through a shared involvement in Methodism. They married in Newcastle in 1958. After a three year research study in Northumberland, Eric gained a lectureship at University College London, where he stayed for 48 years. After their move to London Eric and Isobel had three children, Helen, Angus and Alison. Family holidays often revolved around visiting graveyards and churches, the five travelling in Eric's VW campervan with many arguments around who was allowed to sit in the front! The children were forbidden to tamper with rock samples in their




father's study and spent weekends exploring the science labs at UCL and going up and down in the wood-lined lifts, hoping against hope to glimpse philosopher Jeremy Benson's preserved head, which was kept in a display case in the entrance hall!

In 2001, Eric and Isobel retired and moved to Riverside Farm in Watchet, to be near their elder daughter Helen. They had visited over many years and loved the town, with its fossils and blue lias. Eric was soon organising local geological walks and lectures and producing guides and literature about the area as well as forging links with many local organisations and projects.

He became involved with the West Somerset Railway, and through Helen's role at The Seahorse Centre in Minehead, helped people with learning difficulties to design and create the geological wall built on Watchet Station.

continues on next page continues overleaf 18 19 He brought geologists from far and wide and, until his health intervened, continued to lead beach walks and field trips locally.

Eric continued to keep up his life-long love for running marathons well into his 70s and was President of the Highgate Harriers in London. He always loved dogs, and over time owned three bull



mastiffs, Banner (in London) then Max and latterly Ben. After Isobel's sad death in 2018. Eric lived alone in Riverside Farm, though continued to get out and about to meet friends. He was especially known to all Watchet's dog owners!

In 2019 a group of science colleagues got together to produce a commemorative tribute with a series of anecdotes about Eric, known as 'Ericdotes'. Later they collated and filed a vast body of Eric's work across the years as a homage in order to preserve his knowledge. This is known as the 'Erichive' and it is now housed by University College London. A lasting memory to a remarkable man!

After a series of falls at home and several hospitalisations it became evident that Eric could no longer continue living alone, and he moved to Dunster Lodge in February 2024. He was visited there by friends and past students, and was able to continue his work – corresponding with colleagues on his electric typewriter and posting numerous envelopes packed full of information until shortly before his death.

In March 2024 a special event was organised at Geckoella on Watchet's East Quay. A prestigious collective of geologists paid tribute to him in front of invited guests in a zoom meeting. Through his massive depth of knowledge, not just of geology but of history and architecture, he introduced the public at large to the wonders of geology while bringing diverse members of the geological community together. 'Eric Robinson was a geologist, polymath and raconteur who was driven not so much by ambition as by an insatiable curiosity and love of the natural world'.

Eric not only taught, he encouraged and inspired and he was a family man, as well as friend to many.

We will all sorely miss him.

150th Anniversary of Watchet Lifeboat Station plus links to Watchet Sea Scouts

David Mainwaring has been doing some research about this and found out the following.

July 2025 will be the 150th anniversary of Watchet Lifeboat Station opening. The exact date varies depending on sources, however the RNLI Lifeboat Enthusiasts Society list it as 25th July 1875.

The land for the lifeboat station was a gift from the Countess of Egremont.

The first Lifeboat 1875 - Joseph Somes

Catherine Knight wrote an excellent article in the Watchet Conservation Society newsletter (no 59 in July/August 2018, still available on their website). She writes: "The lifeboat, her carriage and all her gear were forwarded by rail from London to Williton Railway Station, arriving on July 24th and from there by road, in a grand procession onto Watchet. There, a fine ceremony took place on July 25th 1875, and the new lifeboat station was formally opened."

In Grahame Farr's 1966 book, *Wreck and Rescue in the Bristol Channel*, he writes that the *Joseph Somes* arrived at Williton Railway Station on July 29th 1875. A team of horses drew her to Watchet on her carriage, then a colour procession of Rifle Corps Volunteers, Odd Fellows and Foresters and others escorted her through the gaily decorated town. She was dedicated at a brief ceremony. *Joseph Somes* was a 33 foot 10-oared self-righter for carriage launching, this facility enabling her to be taken to Blue Anchor beach in order to be launched, as and when necessary.

John Norman – Coxswain of Watchet's last lifeboat – the Sarah Pilkington

In Tony James' excellent article in the Exmoor magazine Winter 2021 (and in a condensed version of it in the West Somerset Free Press in August 2022), there is no mention of John Norman being coxswain of Watchet's last lifeboat 1919-1944 (using RNLI records). However, when I started my boating out of Watchet in 1980 John was still alive, and both he and his wife, Jessie, who was one of my school teachers at Williton Middle School, told me that he had been. I was also told this by Ben Norman (*Tales of Watchet Harbour*) who was one of the *Sarah Pilkington*'s crew as well. When Watchet hosted a regatta in 1982 as part of Maritime Britain year, John wore his cork lifejacket. At the time this was one of the very few intact cork lifejackets in the country and the RNLI made several requests as to whether it could be donated to them, but it was already bequeathed to the Market House Museum.



There is an oar (made in 1919) from the *Sarah Pilkington* now in the Watchet Boat Museum, and I understand a display is to be created around it.

There is another, stronger, connection with John Norman. Watchet Scouts started as Land Scouts before World War I. During the war John Norman, then a patrol leader aged 15, took three Watchet Scouts to join six others for coastal duties in Cornwall. Later he returned to Watchet and re-formed the troop as 1st Watchet Sea Scouts. The Scouts owned two boats and reached a high standard of seamanship at Watchet. John Norman himself won the Scout Silver Medal for Gallantry after rescuing his father from drowning during a storm in Watchet harbour. John's medal was presented to him by Baden-Powell.

The name Sarah Pilkington still lives on in Watchet, as the Celtic Longboat used by Watchet Sea Rowers (part of the Watchet Boat Owners Association) was named after her in 2006, and was christened by Ben Norman.
